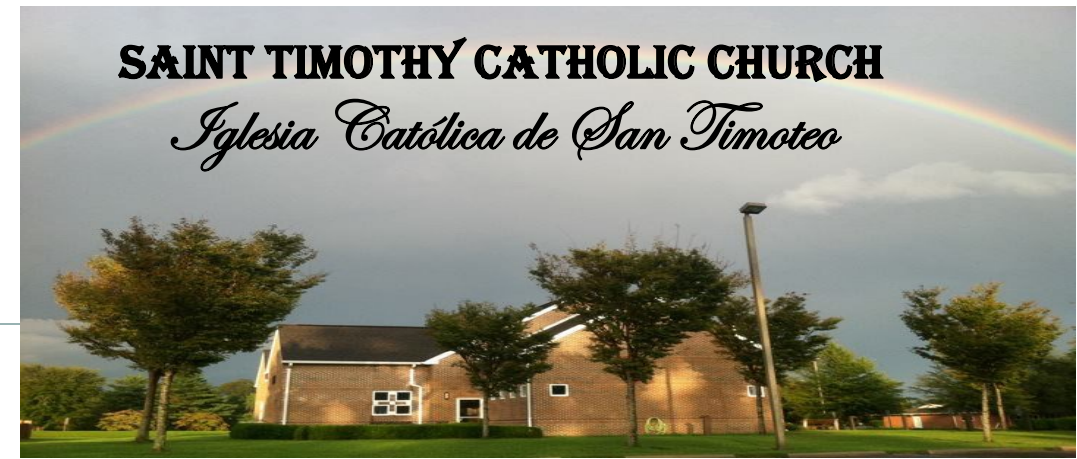

Why do we believe in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist?

It all is in the Mass which contains the completed work of the Savior in his sacrifice on the cross. All the worship of the true God in the Old Testament is summed up and fulfilled in this supreme act of worship. Further, all the events and teachings and laws of the Old Testament were to have their perfection in Christ's saving work, which the Mass presents by an efficacious sign. That is why the risen Christ on the road to Emmaus gave the disciples the example of how to celebrate the Mass by explaining all that referred to him in the writings of Moses, the prophets, and the Psalms. As the cycle of readings heard throughout the liturgical year reminds us, the Mass is the fulfillment of all these things accomplished in Christ's passion and in the sacrifice of his body and blood.

This is why Our Lord said, "With a desire I have desired to eat this supper with you before I suffer" (Luke 22:15). The Mass contains, under concise symbols, the essence of the whole story of our salvation. So in the Mass, we celebrate what we believe in, the corporeal, substantial presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It means that the whole Christ is present in the consecrated host and wine – the resurrected and glorified body and blood of Christ with soul, and divinity. It is not a spiritual or symbolic presence as non-Catholics believe. It is also different from his presence in the Bible and in the praying community. Fathers of the Church starting from the first century believed it, based on John 6:45-59, Mt. 26:26-28, & 1 Cor. 11:27. In John 6:45-59, Jesus says that he is the bread from heaven, and that the bread that he will give is his flesh for the life of the world. In Mt. 26:26-28 we read: "Now as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and blessed, and broke it, and gave it to the disciples and said, "Take, eat; this is my body." 27 And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them, saying, "Drink of it, all of you; 28 for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" Finally, Jesus gave his apostles the commission: "Do this in remembrance of Me." The Church from the first century understood what Jesus said literally. In 1 Cor. 11:27 Saint Paul says that if we partake of the bread unworthily, we are guilty of profaning (literally, murdering) the body and blood of Christ. If the Eucharist is just a symbol, then how can we be guilty of profaning Christ's body and blood? Theologians explain how bread and wine becomes the resurrected body and blood of Jesus by "transubstantiation" – a process where "substance" of bread and wine is changed while retaining the "accidents" like color, taste, shape etc. because "nothing is impossible for God."

De la pastora

¿Por qué creemos en la presencia real de Jesús en la Eucaristía?

Todo está en la Misa que contiene la obra completa del Salvador en su sacrificio en la cruz. Todo el culto al Dios verdadero en el Antiguo Testamento se resume y cumple en este supremo acto de adoración. Además, todos los acontecimientos y enseñanzas y leyes del Antiguo Testamento debían tener su perfección en la obra salvífica de Cristo, que la Misa presenta como un signo eficaz. Por eso Cristo resucitado en el camino de Emaús dio a los discípulos el ejemplo de cómo celebrar la Misa explicando todo lo que a él se refiere en los escritos de Moisés, los profetas y los Salmos. Como nos recuerda el ciclo de lecturas escuchado a lo largo del año litúrgico, la Misa es el cumplimiento de todas estas cosas realizadas en la pasión de Cristo y en el sacrificio de su cuerpo y sangre.

Es por eso que Nuestro Señor dijo: "Con un deseo he deseado comer esta cena con vosotros antes de sufrir" (Lucas 22:15). La Misa contiene, bajo símbolos concisos, la esencia de toda la historia de nuestra salvación. Entonces, en la Misa, celebramos aquello en lo que creemos, la presencia corporal y sustancial de Cristo en la Eucaristía. Significa que todo Cristo está presente en la hostia y el vino consagrados: el cuerpo y la sangre resucitados y glorificados de Cristo con alma y divinidad. No es una presencia espiritual o simbólica como creen los no católicos. También es diferente de su presencia en la Biblia y en la comunidad de oración. Los Padres de la Iglesia a partir del primer siglo lo creían, basados en Juan 6:45-59, Mt. 26:26-28, y 1 Cor. 11:27. En Juan 6:45-59, Jesús dice que él es el pan del cielo, y que el pan que dará es su carne para la vida del mundo. En Mt. 26:26-28 leemos: "Mientras comían, tomó Jesús el pan, y bendijo, y lo partió, y se lo dio a los discípulos y dijo: Tomad, comed; este es mi cuerpo." 27 Y tomando una copa, y habiendo dado gracias, se la dio, diciendo: Bebed de ella todos; 28 porque esto es mi sangre del pacto, que es derramada por muchos para el perdón de los pecados." Finalmente, Jesús les dio a sus apóstoles la comisión: "Hagan esto en memoria mía". La Iglesia del primer siglo entendió lo que Jesús dijo literalmente. En 1 Cor. 11:27 San Pablo dice que si participamos indignamente del pan, somos culpables de profanar (literalmente, asesinar) el cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo. Si la Eucaristía es solo un símbolo, ¿cómo podemos ser culpables de profanar el cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo? Los teólogos explican cómo el pan y el vino se convierten en el cuerpo y la sangre resucitados de Jesús mediante la "transubstanciación", un proceso en el que se cambia la "sustancia" del pan y el vino mientras se conservan los "accidentes" como el color, el sabor, la forma, etc. porque "nada es imposible" por Dios."
