




### Beatitudes, A Christian Goal of Happiness

Real happiness lies in what are known as "the Beatitudes." "Beatitudes" are technically known as "macarisms," (blessings - from the Greek *makarios*, meaning "blessed" or "happy"). These beatitudes echo Isaiah 61:1-2. Other examples of macarisms can be found in the Book of Proverbs, the Psalms, and even in the book of Revelation. There are thirty-seven beatitudes in the New Testament, seventeen of which are sayings of Jesus. Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses who teaches us from the mountain that Christianity is more than obeying the Ten Commandments. The Sermon on the Mount is almost surely a collection of Jesus' teachings rather than a sermon delivered in one sitting.

The beatitudes of Jesus were taught in Aramaic. They are not simple statements; rather they are exclamations, i.e., "O! The blessedness of the poor in spirit!" Matthew presents the Beatitudes as coming at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. He gives eight Beatitudes (the ninth being an explanation of the eighth). They are the ones that define our Christian goal of eternal happiness and explain the attitudes and actions necessary to reach it.

In the Beatitudes, Jesus outlines the values and attitudes needed to enter and enjoy God's kingdom: poverty of spirit, hunger and thirst for justice, compassion, meekness, mercy, integrity, peacemaking and the willingness to suffer persecution for the sake of justice. The Beatitudes contain the most essential aspects of Christian behavior that we need to make habitual if we are to live the truly Christ-like lives of loving obedience and compassion that He asks of all of us who believe. The Beatitudes spell out the personal qualities expected of a disciple of Jesus and the way of life to be lived by Jesus' disciples. They show us the values that Christ cares about. In essence, the Beatitudes both fulfill and complete the Ten Commandments. While the Ten Commandments, given to Moses on Mount Sinai in the Old Testament Book of Exodus, provide a series of "Thou shalt nots," Jesus presents the Beatitudes in a positive sense, as the virtues in life which will ultimately lead us to the rewards of salvation - not in this world, but in the next. Therefore, let us respond to the challenge of the Beatitudes in daily life, by being compassionate people, to be men and women who are pure in heart, and to become the peacemakers in our dealings with one another, in our families and in the society at large, even when this approach to things exposes us to ridicule and persecution.

### Bienaventuranzas, una Meta Cristiana de Felicidad

La verdadera felicidad se encuentra en lo que se conoce como "las Bienaventuranzas". Las "bienaventuranzas" se conocen técnicamente como "macarismos" (bendiciones, del griego makarios, que significa "bienaventurado" o "feliz"). Estas bienaventuranzas hacen eco de Isaías 61:1-2. Otros ejemplos de macarismos se pueden encontrar en el Libro de Proverbios, los Salmos e incluso en el libro del Apocalipsis. Hay treinta y siete bienaventuranzas en el Nuevo Testamento, diecisiete de las cuales son dichos de Jesús. Mateo presenta a Jesús como el nuevo Moisés que nos enseña desde la montaña que el cristianismo es más que obedeciendo los Diez Mandamientos. El Sermón del Monte es casi seguramente una colección de enseñanzas de Jesús en lugar de un sermón pronunciado en una sola sesión.

Las bienaventuranzas de Jesús se enseñaban en arameo. No son simples declaraciones; más bien son exclamaciones, es decir, "¡Oh! ¡La bienaventuranza de los pobres en espíritu!" Mateo presenta las Bienaventuranzas al comienzo del Sermón de la Montaña. Da ocho Bienaventuranzas (siendo la novena una explicación de la octava). Son las que definen nuestra meta cristiana de felicidad eterna y explicar las actitudes y acciones necesarias para alcanzarla.

En las Bienaventuranzas, Jesús describe los valores y actitudes necesarios para entrar y disfrutar del reino de Dios: pobreza de espíritu, hambre y sed de justicia, compasión, mansedumbre, misericordia, integridad, pacificación y disponibilidad para sufrir la persecución por causa de la justicia. Las Bienaventuranzas contienen los aspectos más esenciales del comportamiento cristiano que debemos hacer habituales si queremos vivir una vida verdaderamente cristiana de obediencia amorosa y compasión que Él nos pide a todos los que creemos. Las Bienaventuranzas explican las cualidades personales que se esperan de un discípulo de Jesús y la forma de vida que deben vivir los discípulos de Jesús. Nos muestran los valores que le importan a Cristo. En esencia, las Bienaventuranzas cumplen y completan los Diez Mandamientos. Mientras que los Diez Mandamientos, dados a Moisés en el Monte Sinaí en el Libro del Éxodo del Antiguo Testamento, proporcionan una serie de "No harás", Jesús presenta las Bienaventuranzas en un sentido positivo, como las virtudes en la vida que finalmente nos llevarán a la recompensas de la salvación, no en este mundo, sino en el venidero.

Por lo tanto, respondamos al desafío de las Bienaventuranzas en la vida diaria, siendo personas compasivas, siendo hombres y mujeres puros de corazón, y convirtiéndonos en pacificadores en nuestro trato mutuo, en nuestras familias y en la sociedad. en general, aun cuando este enfoque de las cosas nos exponga al ridículo ya la persecución.

### Knights Join 50th Annual March for Life
