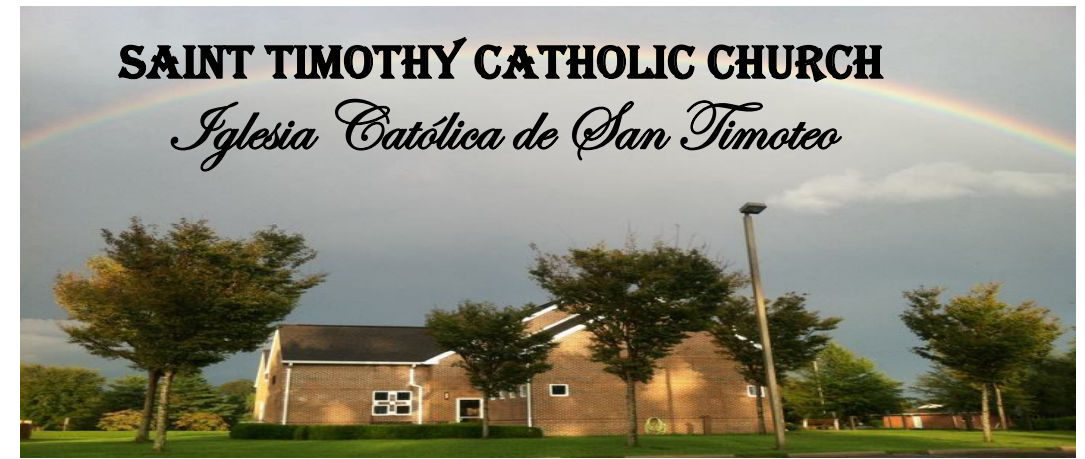

Apostolic (Sacred) Tradition as a Source of Catholic Faith

Scripture, Tradition and the Magisterium: Tradition is something handed down from one generation to the next. We are familiar with secular traditions or customs. Examples are eating roast turkey at Thanksgiving, toasting the bride and groom after a wedding, throwing wedding rice, lighting candles on birthday cakes, and saluting the flag. Some traditions like advent candles, the May crowning, and wearing ashes on Ash Wednesday have religious significance. But Sacred Tradition is different. It is the oral teaching of Jesus Christ handed on to the Apostles and the Church, which carries equal weight with the Church's book, the Bible. It is everything – other than Sacred Scripture – which was received by the Apostles from Jesus Christ, which was handed on by them to their successors and the Church. Sacred Tradition is the living and growing truth of Christ contained in the common teaching, common life, and common worship of the Church. Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture form one sacred deposit of the word of God, committed to the Church. *“Therefore, both sacred Tradition and sacred Scripture are to be accepted and venerated with the same devotion and reverence”* (*Dei Verbum* 9). Like a three-legged stool, the trinity of divine revelation, namely, Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the *Magisterium* (Christ-given and Spirit-guided teaching authority of the Church), makes sure that the Word of God is faithfully handed on to each succeeding generation. Since Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture come from one and the same divine Source, there is a close connection between them, for, taken together, they form one sacred deposit of the word of God. Neither of them is complete without the other. As the words themselves imply, SACRED SCRIPTURE is the written word of God, divinely inspired by the Holy Spirit; and SACRED TRADITION is divinely guided “handing down” of that revealed truth entrusted to the apostles, and passed on written or unwritten.

Living Tradition and the Origin of Sacred Tradition: The teachings of Sacred Tradition are not necessarily written down. Rather, these teachings are present in the world as they are lived out. Thus they are handed on by the lives of those who have lived according to these teachings, as they themselves followed the example of Christ and the Apostles (1 Corinthians 11:2, 2 Thessalonians 2:15). This perpetual handing on, or transmission, from one generation to the next of the teachings of Tradition is called a “living Tradition.” The Council of Trent explains how we got Sacred Tradition: *“Such truths and teaching are contained in written books and in the unwritten traditions that the apostles received from Christ himself (John 20:30; 21:35) or that were handed on, as it were from hand to hand, from the Apostles under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and so have come down to us”* (Council of Trent, *Decree on Sacred Scripture and Tradition:* Denziger 783 [1501]). The Second Vatican Council teaches that “Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture form one sacred deposit of the Word of God, committed to the Church” (*Dei Verbum* 10). For Catholics, Sacred Tradition stands with Scripture in forming the one single deposit of the Faith. They complement and confirm one another. *“Sacred Scripture is the word of God inasmuch as it is consigned to writing under the inspiration of the divine Spirit, while Sacred Tradition takes the word of God entrusted by Christ the Lord and the Holy Spirit to the Apostles, and hands it on to their successors in its full purity”* (*Dei Verbum* 9). Scripture cannot be in conflict with Tradition, and one of the ways this is guaranteed is by Sacred Tradition.

DEL PASTOR

La Tradición Apostólica (Sagrada) como Fuente de la fe Católica

Escritura, Tradición y Magisterio: La tradición es algo que se transmite de generación en generación. Estamos familiarizados con las tradiciones o costumbres seculares. Algunos ejemplos son comer pavo asado en el Día de Acción de Gracias, brindar por los novios después de una boda, arrojar arroz nupcial, encender velas en los pasteles de cumpleaños y saludar a la bandera. Algunas tradiciones como las velas de adviento, la coronación de mayo y el uso de cenizas el Miércoles de Ceniza tienen un significado religioso. Pero la Sagrada Tradición es diferente. Es la enseñanza oral de Jesucristo transmitida a los Apóstoles y a la Iglesia, que tiene el mismo peso que el libro de la Iglesia, la Biblia. Es todo, excepto la Sagrada Escritura, lo que los Apóstoles recibieron de Jesucristo, lo que ellos transmitieron a sus sucesores ya la Iglesia. La Sagrada Tradición es la verdad viva y creciente de Cristo contenida en la enseñanza común, la vida común y el culto común de la Iglesia. La Sagrada Tradición y la Sagrada Escritura forman un depósito sagrado de la palabra de Dios, encomendada a la Iglesia. *“Por lo tanto, tanto la sagrada Tradición como la Sagrada Escritura deben ser acogidas y veneradas con la misma devoción y reverencia”* (*Dei Verbum* 9). Como un taburete de tres patas, la trinidad de la revelación divina, es decir, la Sagrada Escritura, la Sagrada Tradición y la el *Magisterio* (la autoridad docente de la Iglesia dada por Cristo y guiada por el Espíritu), se asegura de que la Palabra de Dios se transmita fielmente a cada generación sucesiva. Dado que la Sagrada Tradición y la Sagrada Escritura provienen de una y la misma Fuente divina, hay una estrecha conexión entre ellos, porque, en conjunto, forman un depósito sagrado de la palabra de Dios. Ninguno de ellos está completo sin el otro. Como las palabras mismas lo implican, LA SAGRADA ESCRITURA es la palabra escrita de Dios, divinamente inspirada por el Espíritu Santo; y la SAGRADA TRADICIÓN es la "transmisión" divinamente guiada de esa verdad revelada confiada a los apóstoles, y transmitida escrita o no escrita.

Tradición Viva y el Origen de la Tradición Sagrada: Las enseñanzas de la Tradición Sagrada no están necesariamente escritas. Más bien, estas enseñanzas están presentes en el mundo a medida que se viven. Así son transmitidos por la vida de aquellos que han vivido de acuerdo con estas enseñanzas, siguiendo ellos mismos el ejemplo de Cristo y los Apóstoles (1 Corintios 11:2, 2 Tesalonicenses 2:15). Esta transmisión perpetua de una generación a la siguiente de las enseñanzas de la Tradición se denomina "Tradición viva". El Concilio de Trento explica cómo obtuvimos la Sagrada Tradición: *“Tales verdades y enseñanzas están contenidas en los libros escritos y en las tradiciones no escritas que los apóstoles recibieron del mismo Cristo (Juan 20:30; 21:35) o que fueron transmitidos, como fue de mano en mano, de los Apóstoles bajo la inspiración del Espíritu Santo, y así ha llegado hasta nosotros”* (Concilio de Trento, *Decreto sobre la Sagrada Escritura y la Tradición:* Denziger 783 [1501]). El Concilio Vaticano II enseña que “La Sagrada Tradición y la Sagrada Escritura forman un depósito sagrado de la Palabra de Dios, encomendada a la Iglesia”. (*Dei Verbum* 10). Para los católicos, la Sagrada Tradición está junto con las Escrituras en la formación del único depósito de la Fe. Se complementan y confirman mutuamente. *“La Sagrada Escritura es palabra de Dios en cuanto que se pone por escrito bajo la inspiración del Espíritu divino, mientras que la Sagrada Tradición toma la palabra de Dios confiada por Cristo Señor y el Espíritu Santo a los Apóstoles, y la transmite a sus sucesores en toda su pureza”* (*Dei Verbum* 9). La Escritura no puede estar en conflicto con la Escritura, y una de las formas en que esto está garantizado es por la Sagrada Tradición.

Itinerary

Day 1 | Departure
Depart for your overnight flight to the Holy Land. Meals will be served on board.

Day 2 | Arrival
Arrive at Tel Aviv Airport. Meet your guide, drive to your hotel in Nazareth for dinner and overnight.

Day 3 | Nazareth, Cana
Start the day in Nazareth at the Basilica of the Annunciation where we will celebrate a Mass. Walk to the Church of St. Joseph's workshop. Continue to the site where Jesus performed His first miracle, Cana, where the married couples would renew their wedding vows at the wedding church. In the afternoon, climb Mt. Tabor, site of the Transfiguration of Jesus. Experience the views where Peter, James and John saw the Glorified Lord with Moses and Elijah.

Day 4 | Tiberias, Sea of Galilee, Mount of Beatitudes
On this day, we will start with a visit to the Mount of Beatitudes, where Jesus preached the Sermon on the Mount. Continue to Tabgha for a visit to the church of the Multiplication of the Loaves and Fish. Take a memorable boat ride across the same lake Jesus walked, the Sea of Galilee. After Lunch, visit the Church of Peter's Primacy where Peter declares his love for Jesus three times. Continue to Capernaum the home town of Jesus to see the ruins of the ancient synagogue and St. Peter's house.

Day 5 | Caesarea Maritima, Haifa
After Breakfast, we drive to Caesarea, capital of the Roman province, where we visit the Roman and Crusader remains and the harbor from which St. Paul was taken prisoner to Rome. Continue to Haifa where we visit Mount Carmel and Cave of Elijah. Enjoy panoramic views of the Mediterranean Sea and Haifa City including the Baha'i Shrine and gardens. Drive to Bethlehem, check in to your hotel and gather for dinner.

Day 6 | Bethlehem, Shepherd's Field, Ein Karem
Start our day in Bethlehem at the Church of the Nativity where we will celebrate a Mass. Visit the cave -the birthplace of Jesus- beneath the church. After lunch, drive to the town of Beit Sahour where we find the Shepherd's Fields to see the place where the Shepherds saw the star of the Nativity. Continue to Ein Karem, the birth place of St. John the Baptist. Drive back to your hotel for dinner and overnight.

Day 7 | Jericho, Qumran, Dead Sea
After breakfast, continue your journey to the real site of Jesus' Baptism by the Jordan River. Visit Jericho the oldest city in the world, view Mount of Temptation where Jesus was tempted by the devil. Celebrate Mass at the Good Shepherd Parish in Jericho. Drive to Qumran where the Dead Sea Scrolls were first discovered. We will have a dip in the Dead Sea salty water. Enjoy shopping in Bethlehem, buy souvenirs for you and your family. Drive back to your hotel for dinner and overnight.

Day 08 | Old City of Jerusalem
Start the day very early, praying the Stations of the Cross as we walk the true way of the Cross (Via Dolorosa). Then we will visit the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, where Jesus was crucified, buried, and then rose again. View the Convent of Zion Sisters and visit St. Ann's Church (birthplace of the Virgin Mary).

Day 09 | Western Wall, Mt. Zion, Mt of Olives, Gethsemane
Drive to the Mount of Olives for a wonderful view of Jerusalem. Visit Pater Noster Church where the lord's prayer "Our Father" was first taught. Walk the Palm Sunday way. At the foot of the mountain, see the Garden of Gethsemane with its ancient olive trees and the Church of All Nations (with the rock where Jesus prayed in agony). Visit the Walling (or Western) Wall, with views of the Al-Aksa Mosque and Dome of the Rock. See the site known as David's memorial. Visit the Caenaculum, the place where the Last Supper occurred as well as the Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Visit Church of St. Peter in Gallicantu where St. Peter denied Jesus.

Day 10 | Return to USA
