Apostolic (Sacred) Tradition as a Source of Catholic Faith (Continued from 7/9/2023)

The Problem of Jesus Criticizing the Jewish Traditions: "You hypocrites!" declared Jesus to the scribes and Pharisees. "Well did Isaiah prophesy of you, when he said, 'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines the precepts of men'" (Matthew 15:6-9; confer also Mark 7:8–9 and Colossians 2:8). What inspired this harsh rebuke was the scribes and Pharisees' attack on Jesus' disciples for their failure to observe the religious custom of the ritual washing of their hands before eating. The object of Jesus' criticism was the tradition of Korban – the custom of dedicating one's belongings to the Temple, while retaining their use. This practice allowed one to forego familial obligations to support one's elderly parents by claiming one's property was dedicated to the Temple and therefore inviolable. Jesus declared this interpretation contrary to the commandment to honor father and mother (Exodus 20:12). Jesus' criticism of Korban did not mean that Jesus rejected all religious tradition, but only those which were contrary to the Scripture. We have Biblical texts to prove the apostolic Church accepted Tradition as a norm for faith and practice (2 Thessalonians 2:15, 1 Corinthians 11:2, 2 Timothy 1:13-14), and that the Bible explicitly says that not everything Jesus did was written down (John 20:30; 21:35). Furthermore, Catholics distinguish capital "T" Tradition, which comes from God, either through Christ or the Apostles (Luke 10:16), from lower-case "t" human traditions or customs. While the latter may (although need not) contradict the Word of God, the former cannot, and it is capital "T" Tradition about which Catholicism is principally concerned. Jesus didn't attack the Catholic view – the idea of Tradition as the authentic understanding and application of the Biblical message. By citing the commandment to honor father and mother, Christ not only subordinated a human tradition to the written Word of God but offered an infallible interpretation and application of a scriptural text, thus establishing the precedent for the Apostles and their successors, the bishops, to follow. The Apostles did the same thing when interpreting the Old Testament or explaining the teaching of Jesus. Apostolic teaching was the standard for the early Church. The interpretative and teaching function of the Pope and the bishops who share in the teaching ministry of Christ and the Apostles (the Magisterium) follows this pattern.

La Tradición Apostólica (Sagrada) como Fuente de la Fe Católica (Continúa desde el 9/7/2023)

El Problema de Jesús Criticando las Tradiciones Judías: "¡Hipócritas!", declaró Jesús a los escribas y fariseos. "Bien profetizó de vosotros Isaías, cuando dijo: 'Este pueblo me honra con los labios, pero su corazón está lejos de mí.; en vano me honran, enseñando como doctrinas preceptos de hombres''' (Mateo 15:6-9; consulte también Marcos 7:8-9 y Colosenses 2:8). Lo que inspiró esta dura reprensión fueron los escribas y fariseos, ataque a los discípulos de Jesús por no observar la costumbre religiosa del ritual de lavarse las manos antes de comer. El objeto de las críticas de Jesús fue la tradición de Korban, la costumbre de dedicar las pertenencias al Templo, conservando su uso. Esta práctica permitía renunciar a las obligaciones familiares de mantener a los padres ancianos al afirmar que la propiedad de uno estaba dedicada al Templo y, por lo tanto, inviolable. Jesús declaró esta interpretación contraria al mandamiento de honrar al padre y a la madre (Éxodo 20:12). La crítica de Jesús a Korban no quiso decir que Jesús rechazó toda tradición religiosa, sino sólo aquellas que fueran contrarias a la Escritura. Tenemos textos bíblicos para probar que la Iglesia apostólica aceptó la Tradición como norma de fe y práctica (2 Tesalonicenses 2:15, 1 Corintios 11: 2, 2 Timoteo 1:13-14), y que la Biblia dice explícitamente que no todo lo que hizo Jesús fue escrito (Juan 20:30; 21:35). Además, los católicos distinguen la Tradición con "T" mayúscula, que proviene de Dios, ya sea a través de Cristo o de los Apóstoles (Lucas 10:16), de las tradiciones o costumbres humanas con "t" minúscula. Mientras que este último puede (aunque no necesariamente) contradecir la Palabra de Dios, el primero no puede, y es la Tradición con "T" mayúscula la que principalmente preocupa al catolicismo. Jesús no solo no atacó el punto de vista católico, la idea de la Tradición como la comprensión y aplicación auténticas del mensaje bíblico. Al citar el mandamiento de honrar al padre y a la madre, Cristo no sólo subordinó una tradición humana a la Palabra escrita de Dios, sino que ofreció una interpretación y aplicación infalibles de un texto bíblico, sentando así el precedente para los Apóstoles y sus sucesores, los obispos, para seguir. Los Apóstoles hicieron lo mismo al interpretar el Antiguo Testamento o explicar la enseñanza de Jesús. La enseñanza apostólica era la norma para la Iglesia primitiva. La función interpretativa y docente del Papa y de los obispos que comparten el ministerio docente de Cristo y de los Apóstoles (el Magisterio), sigue este patrón.

POST OVERTURN OF ROE VS WADE: SUPPORTING MOTHERS AND BABIES

Since Roe v. Wade was overturned June 24, 2022, Knights have redoubled their work to build a culture of life, particularly through the Order's ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy) program, an initiative to boost assistance for pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes. The Knights of Columbus will continue to fight for the lives of the unborn — both in Washington and on the state level — and we will strengthen our support for mothers and their children.

The Knights of Columbus announced ASAP a few weeks before the U.S. Supreme Court decision to overturn Roe v. Wade on June 24, 2022. In his statement on the anniversary of this decision Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly said, "I am proud to announce that Knights across the U.S. and Canada have exceeded their first-year goal by raising more than \$5 million to support mothers and their babies."
