






PRAYER

How Can We Pray in our Busy Lives? Many of us struggle to bring God into the busyness of our lives. Yet God, who is the Lord of all of our lives, is interested in everything we do.

Brother Lawrence was a seventeenth century French monk who knew God's presence at all times. He writes: "*God is everywhere, in all places, and there is no spot where we cannot draw near to Him, and hear Him speaking in our heart.*" His central teaching is that we need to practice being aware of God's presence. "*Whoever practices God's presence will soon become spiritual.*" Paul writes to the Ephesians: "Pray all the time, asking for what you need" (Ephesians 6:18).

How Can We Be in God's Presence? Why not practice awareness of the presence of God today? 1) If you have a watch that beeps on the hour, use this to prompt yourself to become aware of God's presence at that precise moment. 2) Alternatively, put a colored dot on your diary, or on your mobile phone. Every time you see it, pray a brief prayer for someone in your mind at that time. 3) Book yourself an appointment with God for prayer in your diary. It may only be a half-hour or 15-minute slot. Make sure that you are never late for it, as you may be for some of your other appointments!

A Place to Pray: We can pray at all times and in all places, and it is good to develop the confidence in prayer to do this. However, it is also good to be able to find some place where our thoughts are less easily distracted for deeper times of prayer and meditation. In our "prayer corner," we might find it helpful to have other items around us; e.g., a Bible, a cross, or perhaps a candle.

Hindrances to Prayer: Once people have started praying, the most common barrier to prayer (for 80% of people) is wandering thoughts, even amongst people who pray a great deal. Two-thirds also found noise or other distractions a problem. "Keeping concentration" is a barrier to prayer for 40% of people.

Solution: We are not to worry about our mind getting distracted, but gently bring it back to focus on God, and the area we were praying about. St. Francis de Sales said, "Even if you did nothing in your meditation but bring your heart back, and place it again in our Lord's presence, though it went away again every time you brought it back, your hour would be very well employed." Many Christians lead busy lives, with our minds working in overdrive to cover all of the things that we need to think about in our various roles. It is good to ease into prayer gently, perhaps by listening to a praise and worship CD, or by reading a psalm or another passage from the Bible, or simply by reflecting on what we have to be thankful for. Then we can enter into a conversation with God with our minds properly prepared.

ORACIÓN

¿Cómo Podemos Orar en Nuestras Vidas Ocupadas? Muchos de nosotros luchamos por traer a Dios al ajetreo de nuestras vidas. Sin embargo, Dios, que es el Señor de todas nuestras vidas, está interesado en todo lo que hacemos.

El hermano Lorenzo fue un monje francés del siglo XVII que conoció la presencia de Dios en todo momento. Escribe: "Dios está en todas partes, en todos los lugares, y no hay lugar donde no podamos acercarnos a Él y oírle hablar en nuestro corazón". Su enseñanza central es que debemos practicar el ser conscientes de la presencia de Dios. "Quien practica la presencia de Dios pronto se volverá espiritual". Pablo escribe a los Efesios: "Orad en todo tiempo, pidiendo lo que necesitéis" (Efesios 6:18).

¿Cómo Podemos Estar en la Presencia de Dios? ¿Por qué no practicar la conciencia de la presencia de Dios hoy? 1) Si tienes un reloj que emite un pitido en hora, úsalo para que te hagas consciente de la presencia de Dios en ese preciso momento. 2) Alternativamente, coloque un punto de color en su agenda o en su teléfono móvil. Cada vez que lo veas, haz una breve oración por alguien que tengas en mente en ese momento. 3) Reserva una cita con Dios para orar en tu diario. Puede que solo sea un intervalo de media hora o 15 minutos. ¡Asegúrese de no llegar nunca tarde, ya que es posible que llegue a algunas de sus otras citas!

Un Lugar para Orar: Podemos orar en todo momento y en cualquier lugar, y es bueno desarrollar la confianza en la oración para hacerlo. Sin embargo, también es bueno poder encontrar algún lugar donde nuestros pensamientos se distraigan menos fácilmente para momentos más profundos de oración y meditación. En nuestro "rincón de oración", puede resultarnos útil tener otros elementos a nuestro alrededor; p.ej. una Biblia, una cruz o quizás una vela.

Obstáculos para la Oración: una vez que las personas han comenzado a orar, la barrera más común para la oración (para el 80 % de las personas) son los pensamientos dispersos, incluso entre las personas que oran mucho. Dos tercios también consideraron que el ruido u otras distracciones eran un problema. "Mantener la concentración" es un obstáculo para la oración para el 40% de las personas.

Solución: No debemos preocuparnos de que nuestra mente se distraiga, sino traerla suavemente de regreso para enfocarnos en Dios y en el área por la que estábamos orando. San Francisco de Sales dijo: "Incluso si en tu meditación no hicieras nada más que traer tu corazón de regreso y colocarlo nuevamente en la presencia de nuestro Señor, aunque desapareciera cada vez que lo trajeras de regreso, tu hora estaría muy bien empleada." Muchos cristianos llevan vidas ocupadas, con nuestras mentes trabajando a toda marcha para abarcar todas las cosas en las que debemos pensar en nuestros diversos roles. Es bueno comenzar a orar suavemente, tal vez escuchando un CD de alabanza y adoración, leyendo un salmo u otro pasaje de la Biblia, o simplemente reflexionando sobre aquello por lo que debemos estar agradecidos. Entonces podremos entablar una conversación con Dios con nuestra mente debidamente preparada.

Last week, two cargo planes funded by the Knights of Columbus delivered food to the people of Maui. Backed by a \$200,000 donation from the Knight's Disaster Relief Fund, Knights are building temporary housing for displaced victims and families and have helped build a temporary facility for Sacred Hearts Catholic School in Lahaina.



Itinerary

Day 1 | Departure
Depart for your overnight flight to the Holy Land. Meals will be served on board.

Day 2 | Arrival
Arrive at Tel Aviv Airport. Meet your guide, drive to your hotel in Nazareth for dinner and overnight.

Day 3 | Nazareth, Cana
Start the day in Nazareth at the Basilica of the Annunciation where we will celebrate a Mass. Walk to the Church of St. Joseph's workshop. Continue to the site where Jesus performed His first miracle, Cana, where the married couples would renew their wedding vows at the wedding church. In the afternoon, climb Mt. Tabor, site of the Transfiguration of Jesus. Experience the views where Peter, James and John saw the Glorified Lord with Moses and Elijah.

Day 4 | Tiberias, Sea of Galilee, Mount of Beatitudes
On this day, we will start with a visit to the Mount of Beatitudes, where Jesus preached the Sermon on the Mount. Continue to Tabgha for a visit to the church of the Multiplication of the Loaves and Fish. Take a memorable boat ride across the same lake Jesus walked, the Sea of Galilee. After Lunch, visit the Church of Peter's Primacy where Peter declares his love for Jesus three times. Continue to Capernaum the home town of Jesus to see the ruins of the ancient synagogue and St. Peter's house.

Day 5 | Caesarea Maritima, Haifa
After breakfast, we drive to Caesarea, capital of the Roman province, where we visit the Roman and Crusader remains and the harbor from which St. Paul was taken prisoner to Rome. Continue to Haifa where we visit Mount Carmel and Cave of Elijah. Enjoy panoramic views of the Mediterranean Sea and Haifa City including the Baha'i Shrine and gardens. Drive to Bethlehem, check in to your hotel and gather for dinner.

Day 6 | Bethlehem, Shepherd's Field, Ein Karem
Start our day in Bethlehem at the Church of the Nativity where we will celebrate a Mass. Visit the cave - the birthplace of Jesus - beneath the church. After lunch, drive to the town of Beit Sahour where we find the Shepherd's Fields to see the place where the Shepherds saw the star of the Nativity. Continue to Ein Karem, the birth place of St. John the Baptist. Drive back to your hotel for dinner and overnight.

Day 7 | Jericho, Qumran, Dead Sea
After breakfast, continue your journey to the real site of Jesus' Baptism by the Jordan River. Visit Jericho the oldest city in the world, view Mount of Temptation where Jesus was tempted by the devil. Celebrate Mass at the Good Shepherd Parish in Jericho. Drive to Qumran where the Dead Sea Scrolls were first discovered. We will have a dip in the Dead Sea salty water. Enjoy shopping in Bethlehem, buy souvenirs for you and your family. Drive back to your hotel for dinner and overnight.

Day 08 | Old City of Jerusalem
Start the day very early, praying the Stations of the Cross as we walk the true way of the Cross (Via Dolorosa). Then we will visit the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, where Jesus was crucified, buried, and then rose again. View the Convent of Zion Sisters and visit St. Ann's Church (birthplace of the Virgin Mary).

Day 09 | Western Wall, Mt. Zion, Mt of Olives, Gethsemane
Drive to the Mount of Olives for a wonderful view of Jerusalem. Visit Pater Noster Church where the lord's prayer "Our Father" was first taught. Walk the Palm Sunday way. At the foot of the mountain, see the Garden of Gethsemane with its ancient olive trees and the Church of All Nations (with the rock where Jesus prayed in agony). Visit the Walling (or Western) Wall, with views of the Al-Aksa Mosque and Dome of the Rock. See the site known as David's memorial. Visit the Caenaculum, the place where the Last Supper occurred as well as the Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Visit Church of St. Peter in Gallicantu where St. Peter denied Jesus.
